*"The Tensions of Migration: Diversity, Social Inclusion and NFE"*

June 28 - July 1 2018. Belgrade, Serbia

Dear Friends,

It is our great pleasure to invite you to participate in the seminar on "The Tensions of Migration: Diversity, Social Inclusion and NFE" which will be held in Belgrade from 29 June to 1 July 2018.

This four-day local seminar is the second of the work plan series organized by the International Federation of Liberal Youth (IFLRY) in cooperation with the Youth Department of the Council of Europe.

This event will focus on an important but often neglected aspect of migration: social discrimination of particular minority groups—and subsequent political and social exclusion. This phenomenon has been most often observed in the more traditional social environments, including that of Eastern and South-Eastern Europe and parts of the Mediterranean. Uncontrolled refugee streams pose additional severe challenges for those societies that already struggle with the inclusion of ethnic, religious, sexual, and other minorities. Due to the local focus on this seminar, we will be able to accept participants only from Serbia, FYROM, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Montenegro, Bulgaria, Albania, Romania, and Slovenia.

This seminar will adapt the broader perspective of the overall work plan "The Tensions of Migration" to its particular local manifestation of these tensions and directly apply to the challenges that immigrants face in South Eastern Europe offering insights into a longer history of internal migration flows, local tensions and existing discrimination. This broadened perspective will offer participants the engagement with the local historical perspective and thus help them to develop a more profound understanding how to deal with situations of social, ethnic, and religious discrimination and exclusion. We will also introduce, promote, and actively use the concept of Non-Formal Education to display its power and applicability in conflict transformation and social inclusion.

The main aim of the event will be to identify and map existing challenges in order to work out specific solutions that focus on advancing the social inclusion of minorities (core attention on youth) in the participant's' home countries.

From this aim the specific objectives of this event will be:

*To Establish a Firm Understanding of the Relevant Concepts*

- gain a better understanding of the social realities of the local contexts in regards to minority treatment, stigma and discrimination, and migration. This includes a social analysis of socioeconomic factors such as general (moral) attitudes, religion as well as political information
- discuss the features of an open society—and the virtues of a diverse composition of social life

*To Map Barriers to Social, Political, and Economic Inclusion*

- identify existing barriers to social life, map and cluster them by distinguishing between (a) institutionally and (b) socially constructed dimension of stigma and discrimination
- raise awareness of existing tools and mechanisms (in particular look to co-management principle, youth exchange and social support programmes, youth entrepreneurship support etc.) for young people to actively work to fight stigma and discrimination.

*To Get a Deeper Understanding of the Use of Non-Formal Education in Conflict Transformation*

- map the potential areas of application for NFE and human rights education in respect to anti-discrimination, conflict transformation, LGBT rights, and peacebuilding.

*To Develop an Awareness Campaign and/or Policy Solutions*

- create concrete follow-up activities that (a) raise awareness and thus initiate social change and/or (b) promote political/institutional change that reduces political/social/economic barriers. This can also include the use of NFE in anti-discrimination and/or anti-hate-speech campaigns, conflict transformation, and/or peacebuilding.

The seminar is open for the participants from South-Eastern and Eastern Europe. Given the nature of the topic, participants with a background and keen interest in migration, minority rights and discrimination, and Non-Formal Education (NFE) are highly encouraged to apply.

#### Date & Venue:

#### Funding:

IFLRY has been an ardent advocate of Non-Formal Education and is using it as a leading approach in its events and activities.
